16TH ANNUAL NORTHERN NATIVE PLANT SALE

Bayfield Regional Conservancy

Bayfield Regional Conservancy's 16th Annual Northern Native Plant Sale encourages gardeners to mix native plants into their gardens for a healthier ecosystem. This stop features native plant vendors selling dozens of varieties of plants, along with experts on hand to answer questions. This year, three knowledgeable professionals will host an "Ask the Expert" table; Sarah Boles of Northern Native Plantscapes; Phil Freeman, a retired USFS forester, and Nile Merton of Bay Area Restoration Services who specializes in invasive plant control and removal.

ISAAC WING HOUSE


This traditional perennial garden has been evolving for the past 22 years. The Isaac Wing House was built in 1872, by Isaac Wing. Wing was ever willing to share his assets and wealth with the community, establishing a new cemetery ground, a portion of the Pike's Creek fish hatchery grounds, buying firefighting equipment for his namesake, donating a town lot for the Methodist-Episcopal parsonage, and establishing a scholarship fund at the Washburn High School until he passed away in 1907.

GARDEN GUEST HOUSE

Garden Guest House This cottage-style garden is predominantly planted with a colorful array of perennials accented by a selection of annuals each year. A large bed of hostas adds interest to the south section of the garden and a variety of rose bushes line the entranceway. A show stopping purple clematis takes center stage.

The 20 year garden showcases some of Wisconsin's native wildflowers. The bees, birds and butterflies, our local pollinators, relish this display of ever-blooming plantings. Three Milkweed varieties are grown for the Monarch butterflies as they follow their flyway from Canada to Mexico and back. The vegetable/herb raised beds keep the family in fresh produce for five months. Eight rain barrels provide much of the water for all these plantings.

THE DOBSON GARDEN

This perennial garden features an array of flowers, retired commercial fishing boats and pond. Walk along the paved trails and soak-in Bayfield's rich maritime history.

BROWN STONE TRAIL

Bayfield Regional Conservancy—Mary O'Brien

This native plant garden contains over 15 species of wildflowers and grasses that are native to northern Wisconsin. Many of the beautiful wildflowers can be seen blooming from June to August in a variety of sizes and colors. Many of the species, including the Ox-Eye Sunflower, are especially important in attracting pollinators such as butterflies and bees. This garden also contains Common Milkweed, which is crucial in the life cycle of monarch butterflies. This garden was created in the June of 2013 by the Bayfield Regional Conservancy with the help of local volunteers.

17 SOUTH 6TH STREET

ACCEDE CPA

- Located on diverse terrain this new entry to the Garden Tour has two water features, both with fountains, healthy frog populations and plant features. Four years in, they are working toward an edible landscape featuring indigenous plants, herb gardens, and wildflowers as well as permaculture features. Grand kids are helping to map the current plants and in planning more edible features for the future for both people and wildlife. Fruit trees, various lilies, narcissus, daffodils should still be on display as well as canna lilies starting to show and roses coming up. Brownstone retaining wall and pathways help complete this entry.

826 WASHINGTON AVENUE*Martha Larson*

- This eclectic garden, inspired by European and Asian garden styles, sits on 7 city lots and has been in process for 18 years. Martha formed the outline of the garden by first clearing the land and then laying down stone paths to define the different spaces. With much attention to foliage style and color, plantings were distributed within the framework created by the paths.

39 N. 5TH STREET*Lissa Fleming**Please view this garden from the street only.*

- In this 17 year-old English-style garden, 85 percent of the plants were harvested from friends and family and replanted to create a truly eclectic mix. The rest of the plants were bought from Hauser's Superior View Farms. Rare hostas are located on north side of house. A native Wisconsin garden is located in the back south garden, along with a vegetable garden on the north side. Fleming is happy to have so much foliage because she "would rather have gardens than grass to mow." All water for irrigating the garden comes from rain. There are 9 rain barrels on 3 corners of the house. Water also drains directly into gardens from gutters so that no city water is used for irrigating.

415 WASHINGTON AVENUE

APOSTLE ISLANDS NATIONAL LAKESHORE HQ

Friends of the Apostle Islands/City of Bayfield

- This water quality improvement garden has existed for 8 years and captures storm run off from the courthouse parking lot, filtering it before it reaches Lake Superior. The three depressions that make up the rain gardens feature a variety of native, blooming plants providing both desirable infiltration and brightening up the courthouse grounds.

Another garden sits at the entrance sign for the Apostle Islands National Lakeshore and the Gaylord Nelson Wilderness. Named after the US Senator who helped establish this National Park in 1971, the garden represents many of the flowering plants found in the Apostle Islands and surrounding area. Senator Nelson was also the founder of Earth Day and visited here often.

The plants seen here come from a variety of habitats including boreal forest, upland deciduous, open meadow and beach/dune community.

Highlighted species are all native. Special plants to look for are Penstemon grandiflorus, Canada Anemone, Alum Root, Prairie Smoke, Golden Alexander, and Baptisia to name a few. The garden is part of the Visitor Center and Park Headquarters for the National Lakeshore. Volunteers from "Friends of the Apostle Islands," a non-profit whose mission is to help protect the Park's natural and cultural features, maintain this garden.

300 N. 4TH STREET

BAYFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

This stop has many steps.

- This school garden began in 2009 and contains several elements including a high tunnel (added in 2013) that produces vegetables and traditional Ojibwe medicinal herbs and spices, a state of the art aquaponics system, an earth oven, an educational wigwam and over an acre of vegetable production. Much of the food produced on site is used in the school's cafeteria. Because this garden is for educational purposes you probably won't find any perfectly lined edges or straight rows of seedlings. It utilizes multiple heirloom varieties of tomatoes, squash and other vegetables that are donated by students' families and elders from the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa. Dual-language signage for many of our plants dot the entire garden. This garden is accepting volunteers!

108 NORTH 3RD STREET

KNIGHT HOUSE

- This cottage-style garden was established 35 years ago and includes several spectacular water features. When Rice bought the house, the backyard had huge trees and stumps, roots had invaded the plumbing, and while the former owners were packing up the basement was also backing up! She got rid of the stumps, graded and sodded a lawn and then unfortunately all the grass grew "ring worm". Over the years, the grass was defeated. Built in 1892, this home is on the site of Fort Bayfield (constructed in 1861) and has ancient white pines on the property. The original owner, William Knight, also started the first commercial apple orchards in the Bayfield area, which survive to this day at Hauser's Superior View Farm.

7 RICE AVENUE

LE CHATEAU BOUTIN

Please view this garden from the street only.

- Built by Frank Boutin Jr. in 1908, this is now operated as an inn, managed by the Phillips family of the Old Rittenhouse Inn.

- This three-season, 22 year-old garden boasts an extensive collection of Oriental and Asiatic Lillies. The garden and grounds are open daily to the public, you do not need to be a guest of the Inn to enjoy the beauty here. Feel free to explore the gardens at your leisure.

This garden features twelve eclectic garden areas. Special plant varieties include two kinds of amsonia, a native plant area, a heather garden, magnolia tree, tamarck tree, smoke bushes, tree lilacs, many lilies and a mini-orchard. Be sure to check out the pond and mini-stream on the property. Master Gardeners will be on-site to provide tours and answer questions at this location.

GARAGE MAHAL ORCHARD

This is your chance to see a real blueberry orchard. Established 12 years ago, in the heart of Bayfield's Orchard area. The farmer will be on hand to answer questions. These special plants have been developed by the Universities of Wisconsin and Michigan. The field was carved out of second growth woodland, which is typical for this part of Wisconsin. A lot of TLC produces outstanding fruit. Modern growing methods have made this area the Fruit Capital of Wisconsin.

ECKELS POTTERY AND FINE CRAFT GALLERY

This is a garden that features lots of large sculptures adding an artistic dimension to the grounds. One unique item is a big pot that at one time held ingredients for making dynamite at the DuPont dynamite factory just south of Washburn. It weighs 2,000 pounds! Daffodils fill up the front of Eckels to greet visitors to Bayfield as they arrive into town during Bayfield in Bloom. Pots, sculptures and other art are interwoven with lupin and perennials that have been tended in this spot for over 40 years.
